MEPEC works collaboratively with public, community and private organizations as well as citizens in relation to the needs of the English-speaking population of the Montérégie-Est in order to:

- **Connect** with and represent the ESC of the Montérégie-Est.
- Improve **communication** between Englishspeaking citizens and local service providers.
- Create or adapt opportunities for the English-speaking citizens of the Montérégie-Est of all ages to learn, socialize and remain active.
- **Facilitate** access to English documentation and services.




Montérégie-Est

MEPEC serves the Montérégie-Est region, which has a population of approximately 24,640 English-speaking residents (Census 2021) in 57 municipalities covering 3,484 km.

The English-speaking population lives mainly in the two RLS (réseau local de services) Pierre-Boucher and Richelieu-Yamaska.

Another year has gone by and looking back, as we emerge from beneath COVID, I have to say we have had a great year.







Organizational Chart




Financial Statement

Funding


MEPEC's main funder is the Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN). Over the past year, MEPEC has received different project funds through CHSSN, Fondation Lucie et André Chagnon and the Canada government, such as Network and Partnership Initiative (NPI), Youth Mental Health Initiative (YMHI), Healthy Early Years (HEY), Community Health Education Program (CHEP), Bright Beginnings (BB), and Supporting and Prevention Mental Health (SPMH). MEPEC has also received funding from McGill University for the McGill

Community Network Bursary Program, the Seniors' Wellness Centre (SWC) and Enhancing Regional Community Capacity (ERCC) from the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise (SRQEA), Programme Action Aînés Québec (PAAQ) from the Québec government, a program and project funding from Canadian Heritage (PCH) and finally from the Regional Development Network (RDN) and the SRQEA for the Employment Strategy Program. In total, MEPEC received \$518,586.68 in funding for the year 2022-2023.


Since 2019, MEPEC has adhered to the CHSSN <u>Partnership Approach</u>, the <u>Community Mobilization Model</u>, the <u>Community Liaison Model</u> and the NPI Wheel in order to reduce barriers and improve access to services in English for Montérégie-Est English-speakers.

The NPI Wheel consists of 5 main components on which MEPEC focuses its strategy: Networking, Representation, Knowledge, Partnership and Outreach. For each component, MEPEC works continuously so the English-speaking community experiences improvements in accessing services and information in English.

Networking & Representation

Throughout the year, MEPEC met with, brought together and mobilized organizations to improve the services for the English-speaking community (ESC). MEPEC met with numerous community, public and private organizations to discuss with and inform them of the needs and realities of the ESC. Additionally, we explored how to improve the well-being of the ESC.

MEPEC also participated in many decisionmaking tables and committees that have an impact on the community. In these instances, MEPEC represented the interests of the ESC and brought to the table its needs and priorities for consideration. MEPEC has presented the needs and priorities of the ESC

Knowledge Development

MEPEC has continued to organize discussion tables and committees to discuss the challenges and priorities of the Englishspeaking population of the Montérégie-Est, and created action plans to improve access to services in the English.

Staff attended 35 training sessions to improve their skills. MEPEC has also hosted a new initiative in the Montérégie, called Montérégie Way, in partnership with its two sister organizations in the Centre and West. This retreat represented an excellent opportunity to gather knowledge, participate in common training and attend workshops to increase our knowledge and better serve the English-speaking community of the Montérégie.

MEPEC with its partners (Riverside School Board, RVCLC, MWCN, Kits for Kids, ARC) produced around 500 school transition bags for English-speaking parents and young children to help them prepare for the transition to school.

Outreach

While attending fairs and community and municipal events, MEPEC distributed more than 200 types of English documents to improve access to information in English.

MEPEC has provided almost 30 referrals and support to the English-speaking citizens. Part of its support, MEPEC refers people in need to the right resources or organizations and offers support in translation from French to English but also English to French.

Our Interim Executive Director participated in a special show at TVR9 in order to raise awareness and promote MEPEC.


Partnerships


In 2022-2023, MEPEC was dedicated to creating formal partnerships to improve access to services in English by increasing learning opportunities, recreational activities and available information.

It is through partnerships and collaboration with community, public and private organizations that MEPEC was able to support the adaptation of existing services and create new initiatives. In the past year, MEPEC maintained and created approximately 35 partnerships and collaborated with organizations on multiple initiatives.

The majority of MEPEC's work was done in collaboration with community-based organizations in the delivery of services. These community-based organizations work primarily in the area of health and social services, but also in education, employment, culture, immigration, early childhood and youth.

MEPEC offered a total of 40 different activities, workshops and events to its members and the English-speaking citizens of the Montérégie-Est. A total of 910 people attended our activities, for an approximate overall attendance of approximately 2808.


