We believe in building an inclusive, supportive, collaborative, educational and friendly environment.


Membership



From April to December 2023, the number of members rose from 283 to 388. However, during December 2023, MEPEC carried out its first membership campaign with the aim of institutionalizing the membership process by identifying and retaining the most active and committed members and recruiting new ones.

From the 388 members, 248 of them reconfirmed their membership and/or became a member by March 2024. It should also be noted that only members over the age of 18 can become members. As a result, children under 18 are not included in the total due to sensitive nature of their personal data. However, we can estimate that around 75 children are unofficial MEPEC members.



As we move into the next year, we remain dedicated to building on these successes and creating even more opportunities for growth, connection, and support within our community.




Initiatives

The year 2023-2024 was extraordinary in the number of initiatives supported, participated in and offered by MEPEC. The organization is very proud to have contributed to the 47 different initiatives organized either in our Community Space or on our partners' premises.


Last year, MEPEC offered services in 7 categories of activity, mainly for seniors and families, but also in mental health, employment and education. Most of the initiatives offered to seniors and families are strongly linked to health and social services, as well as arts and culture. Because of the target population and the fact that most of our funding is aimed at a specific population, we have decided not to separate them from the rest.

MEPEC has also supported and collaborated with partners to propose intergenerational initiatives, and participated in and organized large public events called "Outreach events". Outreach events are large public gatherings where MEPEC set up a booth to advertize the organization's services, as well as the services available in English in the Montérégie-Est region.


A total of 456 events and activities were supported, participated in and offered to our community. The two main areas of activities with the most activities were the seniors and families. MEPEC has created and supported a large number of programs that have become dear to our community this year, to name but a few: Seniors' Sneakers, Aqua Fitness, Art Hive, Sprouts, Family Drop-In, and Puddles.

Of the 456 events and activities supported, participated in and proposed by MEPEC, a total of 7,675 participations were counted. Participation is interpreted here as the number of activities in which a given individual took part. The number of unique individuals reached a total of 2,818 people. It is therefore impressive to say that MEPEC, in the course of 2023–2024, discussed and welcomed over 2,800 individuals (adults and children combined) to its activities.

From 2022-2023 to 2023-2024, there is a 17.5% increase in the initiatives offered, a 209.6% increase in the number of unique individuals who participated in our initiatives, leading to a 173.3% increase in the accumulative participation.


Many initiatives took place in the MEPEC Community Space, such as the Art Hive, Sprouts, Family Drop-in, Book Club, Knitting Group, Bilingual Conversation Group and numerous workshops on health and social services. A total of 528 unique visitors came to the Community Space, for a total of over 2,724 participations to our in-house activities.











MEPEC works daily to develop a solid network of key community, public and private organizations in order to improve, adapt or create initiatives. These initiatives promote better access to services and information in English.

During the 2023-2024 year, MEPEC participated in 187 meetings with 75 community, public and private organizations, and 12 committees and round tables.

MEPEC attaches great importance to the professional development and enhancement of staff knowledge and skills. As a result, MEPEC encourages them to participate in technical training, communities of practice with other network members to facilitate the exchange of best practices, and retreats to enhance more general knowledge. More than 65 sessions have been attended by team members.

In July 2023, MEPEC held its second internal staff retreat to begin work on the next strategic plan for 2024-2027. This was proudly completed and approved by the Board of Directors in March 2024.

Among the many services offered by MEPEC, support for community members is at the very core of its mission. This support can take many forms, such as referral to community resources (financial needs, mental health and employability, etc.), easy access to information in English (health and social services), informal interpretation and orientation in the various government systems. Only 24 interventions were recorded. However, it is estimated that over 200 interventions took place informally, at outreach events and activities, but were unfortunately not recorded.

MEPEC also creates and/or distributes documentation to its community to raise awareness of available services and important information. This year, MEPEC created, updated and shared 18 different documents, such as brochures, pamphlets and fact sheets, to more than 2,940 people. The quantity of documentation distributed is approximative, as some of these documents were shared online, such as the Newsletter and News Round Up, and at outreach events and activities. Also, MEPEC collaborated with its partner organizations to translate 14 documents to be distributed to the English-speaking community.

Volunteering at MEPEC

Again this year, a significant number of volunteers gave their time and energy every week to ensure that MEPEC initiatives were a success. 36 volunteer opportunities were filled by our community library volunteers, our active and enthusiastic parents, our Art Hive expert, our cleaning ladies and our very committed seniors.

MEPEC Community Library

A new addition to the services of the Community Library was made possible through the New Horizons for Seniors project funding, the Kindle Program. During this year, MEPEC has acquired 7 Kindle tablets, so seniors had the opportunity to learn how to use this technology and have more reading opportunities with e-books through the MEPEC's unlimited access to the Kindle library.

To support access to English resources and media, MEPEC has provided the Book Club with the book of the month. In total, 5 e-books and 15 books were added to the library collection. As usual, the library received also a total of 131 book donations from the community that were also added to the collection. Because MEPEC is a member of the First Canada, 200 children books were donated to MEPEC to be redistributed within the community. More than half have been donated to the children participating to the activities.

Furthermore, in partnership with MinibiblioPLUS, from the Hickson-Fraser Institut, MEPEC receive and exchange 200 books for children every 6 months. Those are displayed in the Community Space and added to the children's collection of over 500 books. Every week, families attending our activities borrowed up to 3 to 5 books each. Finally, from its own children's collection, MEPEC created 6 book bins, of approximatively 30 books each, to be lent to elementary school teachers so they can diversify their in-class collections of books. 3 out of the 6 books bins were lent to Mountainview Elementary school.
